VILLAGE OF OTISVILLE ANIMALS IN STREETS Ordinance No. 5

AN ORDINANCE shall not permit horses, cattle or other domestic animals on any street, lane, alley or public grounds in the Village of Otisville.

SECTION 1:

That no swine, sheep, horses, asses, mules, goats or meat cattle, shall be permitted to be tied, hitched or fastened, by any chain, rope or device what so ever, to anything moveable or immovable, whereby said stock may pasture, feed or graze on any street, lane, alley or public grounds in said Village of Otisville. If any swine, sheep, horses, asses, mules, goats or meat cattle, shall be found tethered as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of the Pound Master of said Village to take them into his charge and keep and confine them in the Village Pound, or in some other secure and suitable place in said Village, then to dispose of the same as provided for in cases of stock running at large.

SECTION 2:

Every person who shall, either himself or by his agent, clerk or employee, tether any of the stock mentioned in section one of this Ordinance, contrary to the provisions thereof, on any street, lane, alley or public grounds, or allow his stock to be so tethered. Shall be punished by a fine of not exceeding Twenty-five dollars and cost of prosecution, or imprisonment in the County Jail not more than twenty days, or both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the Court.

This Ordinance shall take effect November 11th 1907.
